Dean's Note

As we reflect on the year 2025, Lagos Business School (LBS) continues to stand at the forefront of driving responsible business and leadership through education, innovation, and collaboration. The LBS Sustainability Centre is a unique demonstration of our commitment to impacting the practice of management and equipping generations of leaders from the boardroom, the entrepreneur's office to the entry level cubicles in all sectors in nations across Africa. The Centre's work focuses on sustainable business, the leadership and management of economic activities in a manner that addresses sustainable development challenges. 2025 has been a remarkable year and I am glad to present to you the annual report of our stewardship, activities, engagement and impact results for 2025.

The LBS Sustainability Centre is a critical partner, voice and enabler in the sustainable business ecosystem in Nigeria, and across the continent. As detailed in this report, we are contributing significantly to knowledge dissemination, discourse, action and research that is advancing the adoption of business, leadership and management practices in sustainable business and sustainable development on the continent. Through the Centre's impactful programmes, robust partnerships, and far-reaching platforms, business leaders, professionals, individuals and sustainability enthusiasts are getting the right skills and knowledge needed to meet the evolving needs of their organisations and communities.

This year, the Centre expanded its academic programmes and increased the frequencies of existing programmes in high demand, introduced new executive courses and certifications focused on sustainable philanthropy and ESG integration. A case in point is the ESG Materiality Assessment and Sustainability Reporting Programme which saw record enrolment, occasioning its increase in delivery from one run to three run cycles, and more planned for 2026, thereby empowering business leaders to prepare for the new phase of corporate reporting in line with Nigeria's adoption of the IFRS1 and S2 reporting standards.

With participation from global, continental and in-country participants, the LBS Sustainability Centre's engagements across its impact projects, forums and programmes have continued to grow and 2025 was no

LBSSC served over 395 participants, 4676 conference and webforum attendees, 4542 subscribers and readers from twenty (20) countries, with our impact and work across material issues of relevance to the African contexts spanning sustainable business, responsible leadership, social enterprise and nonprofit management, circular economy and policy for sustainable development.

To all our partners, participants, faculty, team members and affiliates, we appreciate you and say a big thank you for the progress made so far. Let's do more together in 2026!



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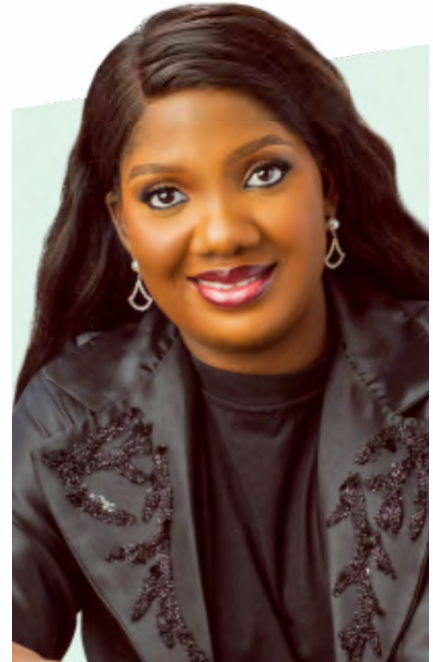
From the Director's Desk

The year 2025 has been a testament to the power of collective action in advancing sustainability across Africa. In 2025, the LBS Sustainability Centre's milestones turned ambition into tangible impact towards embedding sustainability at the heart of business and society.

Through our tailored advisory engagements, certificate and customised programmes, knowledge exchange forums and research, we empowered professionals, entrepreneurs, businesses and corporations to integrate sustainability and environmental, social, and governance (ESG) principles into their core organisational operations. Notably, our work with the firm and leaders in oil and gas, manufacturing and financial sectors took a new dimension from board and executive sessions, customised ESG materiality assessment studies, to industry insight research publications and jointly hosted forums.

Our Sustainability and ESG management focused programme offerings recorded milestone enrolment numbers and completion of over one hundred and fifty (150) business executives. We also commenced a specialised programme theme 'Sustainable Impact Philanthropy Programme (SIPP) supported by the Ford Foundation West Africa Office and as the host institution for the Global Chapter Zero Secretariat, we launched the Nigeria Chapter of the Climate Governance Initiative (CGI) with the support of corporate members and development partner institutions.

We doubled down on our mission to strengthen capacity of executives through learning programmes and seminars, increasing the frequency of our programme cycle runs of the ESG Materiality Assessment and Sustainability Reporting Programme, which accelerates readiness of companies in Nigeria to adopt the IFRS Sustainability and Climate-Related Disclosures (S1 and S2) and the Global Reporting Initiative (GRI) Standards. Working to enhance the sustainability of nonprofits and social enterprises. The Centre held the third edition of the Innocent Chukwuma Social Impact Youth Fellowship which concluded with the Youth Conference themed 'Sustainable Social Impact: A Roadmap for Youths in Transforming Societies' held in May 2025 with over 300 youths in attendance. The ICSI Fellowship graduated 14 Fellows who completed a 3 months-long hybrid programme of leadership, governance, ethics,

emotional intelligence, advocacy, and impact design.

Further to our commitment to advance thought leadership, our knowledge exchange forums served as vibrant platforms for dialogue, learning, and action. Our flagship International Sustainability Conference (ISC), 2025 hybrid edition, themed "The Green Africa Economic Promise: Unlocking Value Through Corporate Sustainability," held in partnership with Global Reporting Initiative (GRI), Shared Value Africa Initiative (SVAI), PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC) Nigeria, CGI Nigeria Chapter and Nestlé Nigeria PLC.

It is worthy of note, the ISC held over two-days with day 1 being a fully virtual forum; day 2, an in-person and hybrid convening convened over 800 multi-sectoral stakeholders from across the globe

to explore practical strategies to harness Africa's green economic promise and natural assets through corporate sustainability, responsible innovation, data-driven governance, and inclusive growth.

In the financial services sector, we partnered with Stanbic IBTC Holdings Plc to shape industry specific discourse through the second edition of the Sustainable Finance Summit themed "Financing Resilience: Digital Innovation and AI for Climate-Smart Communities." The summit was a huge success with over 200 attendees in-person and about 2,000 attendees online, bringing to fore conversations by experts in the financial services and development sectors that forge collaborative action to close Africa's sustainable development financing gap through context-specific finance instruments that enable sustainable business growth on the continent. Staying true to our core purpose but leveraging partnerships, we provided knowledge and content support for

the ESG webinar series delivered by Sterling One Foundation and other esteemed partners to elevate competencies and awareness on ESG, sustainability reporting and corporate governance.

We delivered the Advancing Nutrition, Health and Environmental Awareness through the Media programme in partnership with Nestlé Nigeria PLC which is in its 8th edition and the Leadership Programme for Sustainable Waste Management in support of Aspire Coronation Trust (ACT) Foundation which is in its 7th edition building business for Nigeria's emerging circular economy.

Our international collaborations and engagement include our careers webinar series on sustainability and climate action for the Business School for Climate Leadership (BS4CL) Africa in collaboration with member schools across the continent and supported by the UN Principles for Responsible Management Education (UNPRME) Africa Chapter; our hosting the secretariat to the Climate Governance Initiative (CGI), Nigeria chapter, which launched in June 2025. This is strategically aligned with our thematic focus areas on Responsible Business and Corporate Sustainability and we are glad to report that post-launch, CGI Nigeria has delivered two Director focused events in the course of the year: 'The Directors' Engagement Series' in partnership with the Financial Reporting Council (FRC) of Nigeria and an ISC Masterclass for Directors on the sidelines of the ISC titled "Fiduciary Responsibility and Strategic Oversight in the Age of Sustainability and Climate Related Disclosure," both events facilitated by KPMG Nigeria.

Beyond programme delivery, our research team and affiliates

continue to contribute to critical knowledge expansion areas and documentation. The Centre covers Nigeria in the continent-wide research work on the dignified and fulfilling work for Africa's youth led by our partner, the Centre on African Philanthropy and Social Investment (CAPSI) at WITS Business School. We also published a white paper in partnership with the Stanbic IBTC Holdings PLC Sustainability team as part of outcomes from the inaugural Sustainable Finance Summit, titled 'Sustainable Finance Opportunities in Emerging Markets,' the paper includes unique contributions and peer reviews by the KPMG sustainable finance team, the Impact Investment Foundation Nigeria, and our team of post-doctoral affiliate researchers.

None of these achievements would have been possible without the unwavering commitment of the Centre team of managers, project leads and associates with the significant support of our partners, faculty and professional affiliates, resource persons and the LBS-PAU community at large. These partnerships enabled us to co-create knowledge solutions, share best practices, and amplify the correct narrative on sustainability and business for collective impact. As we look ahead, I remain grateful for the trust and commitment of our stakeholders and we are more determined to advance our work in specific locations in Africa. Together, we are building a future where business success, societal well-being and environmental stewardship go hand in hand.

About LBS Sustainability Centre

The LBS Sustainability Centre is the leading knowledge hub on sustainability and business out of Nigeria and across Sub-Saharan Africa. The Centre was initiated by Prof Chris Ogbechie in 2010 to refocus the relationship between businesses and their stakeholders by contributing to the development of responsible business leaders. We work with organisations, decision makers, business executives and managers to help them incorporate sustainable practices in their operations and develop innovative products and services that transform their communities and create economic value. This enables businesses to sustain livelihoods, reduce poverty, and contribute to national development as well as the achievement of the development priorities as codified in agendas like the African Union Africa Agenda 2063 Goals (The Africa We Want) and United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

What we do



Stakeholder Engagements & Partnerships

Achieving sustainable long-term change in Nigeria requires a significant strengthening of the policy formulation and implementation process. This involves directly influencing policymakers, regulators and companies. The Centre leverages its faculty, digital infrastructure and dialogue sessions to advocate for the improvement of business engagement with society. This strategic focus has met with considerable success. The Centre was involved in the conception of the sustainable banking initiative by the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN). This initiative led to the creation of the Nigerian Sustainable Banking Principles in 2012. The Centre was also involved in the formation of the Nigerian Business Coalition for Sustainable Development (NBCSD) in 2014. The Centre's commitment to collaborative partnership has seen it engage with some of Nigeria's leading organisations to drive the sustainability agenda in Nigeria and beyond.



Capacity Building Programmes

In the Centre's quest for continuous improvement, training programme curricula are consistently assessed with a view to ensuring they remain relevant and of immense use to our participants. As such, the Centre offers a series of capacity building programmes for public officials, business executives, and entrepreneurs, as well as sustainability courses woven into LBS' MBA programmes.



Research

LBS Sustainability Centre conducts industry and practitioner-focused research in business ethics, sustainability, social entrepreneurship and corporate governance. The research output of the Centre serves as the anchor for sustainability courses in Lagos Business School's full-time MBA programmes and executive education curriculum, as well as training programmes.

In our collective resolve to expand the sustainability conversation and embed sustainability thinking in corporate strategy, the Centre's research, seminars and stakeholder engagement are based on the following thematic areas:

Corporate Sustainability



Corporate sustainability entails the approach and action of businesses towards sustainable development, sustainability strategy, shared value, corporate social responsibility (CSR), and corporate philanthropy. It also involves the designing, building, and operating of structural elements in ways that do not diminish the social, economic and ecological processes required to maintain human equity, diversity, and the functionality of natural systems.

Through our knowledge-sharing forums and programmes, LBSSC is committed to helping organisations understand how sustainable business practices and sustainability initiatives create far-reaching impact. We also work with partners and relevant stakeholders on strategic policy advocacy and implementation in the areas of skills development, education, water, nutrition, health and power.

Responsible Business and Leadership



Responsible businesses are principle and value-driven, demonstrating consideration for employees, customers, suppliers and the wider society in the course of their profit-making activities. We believe leadership plays a key role in running responsible businesses that exemplify ethical conduct.

Africa is transforming, and the continent's economic and industrial development should be channelled in a manner that ensures businesses operate responsibly and contribute to the holistic sustainable development vision. Businesses in Africa must develop resilience to withstand the challenges encountered in the course of their every day operations. They should also see themselves as responsible for and to the society from where their businesses emerge, exist and thrive, because businesses are critical change agents, well-positioned to be at the helm of the transformation of Africa.

Circular Economy



A circular economy is based on the principles of design to eliminate waste and pollution, circulate products and materials by keeping them in use, and regenerating natural systems. This industrial model aims to restore or regenerate the ecosystem, society and economy by intention and design.

LBSSC is committed to driving knowledge and action for organisations that replaces the end-of-life concept with restoration, shifts towards the use of renewable energy, eliminates the use of toxic chemicals, which impair reuse and return to the biosphere and aims for the elimination of waste through the superior design of materials, products, systems and business models.

Nonprofits, Civil Society Organisations and Social Enterprises play a pivotal role in the advancement and development of societies and African nations in particular. To ensure the long-term impact of this sector, however, these organisations require effective management and responsible leadership.

Public Policy for Development Outcomes



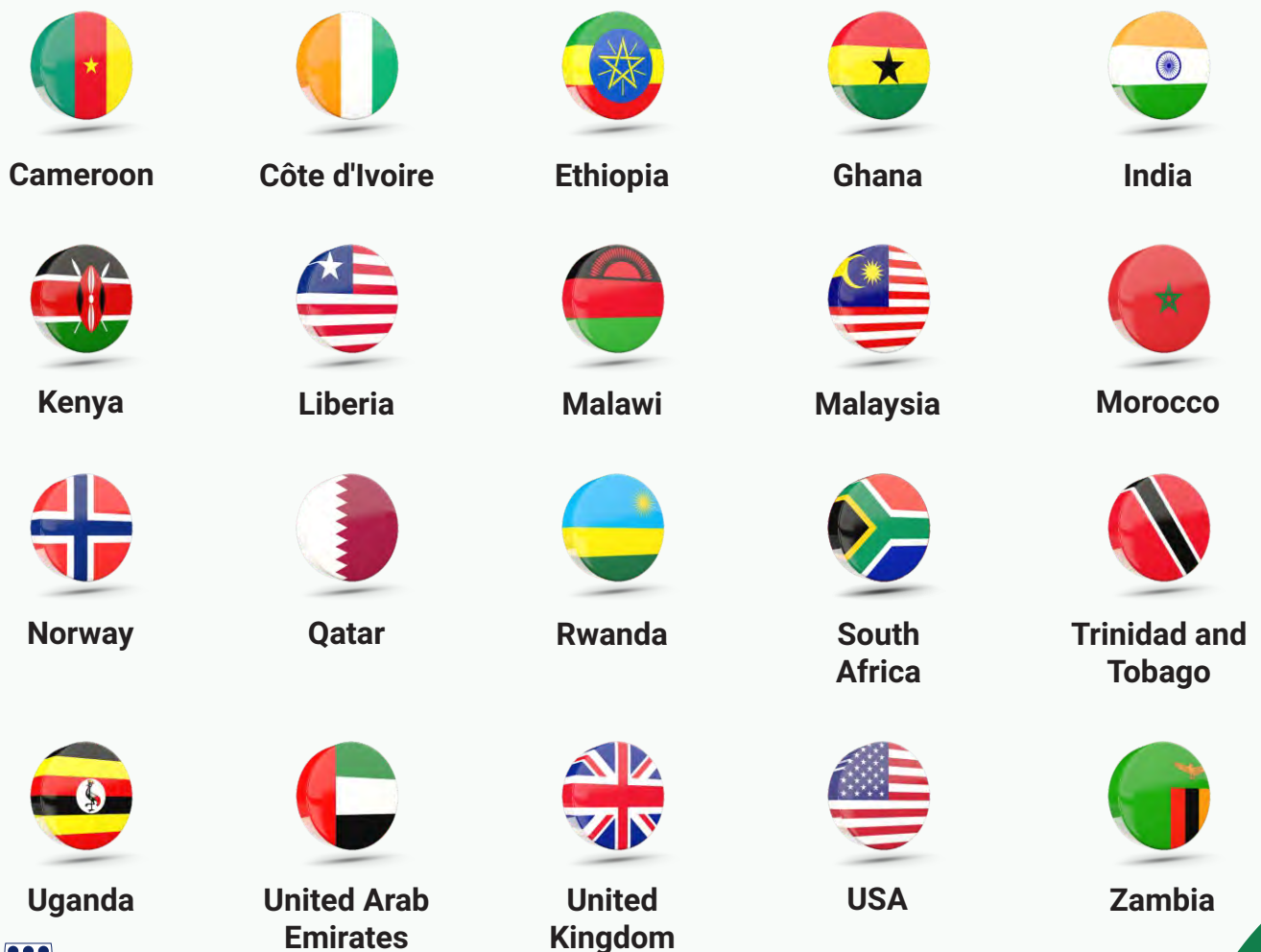



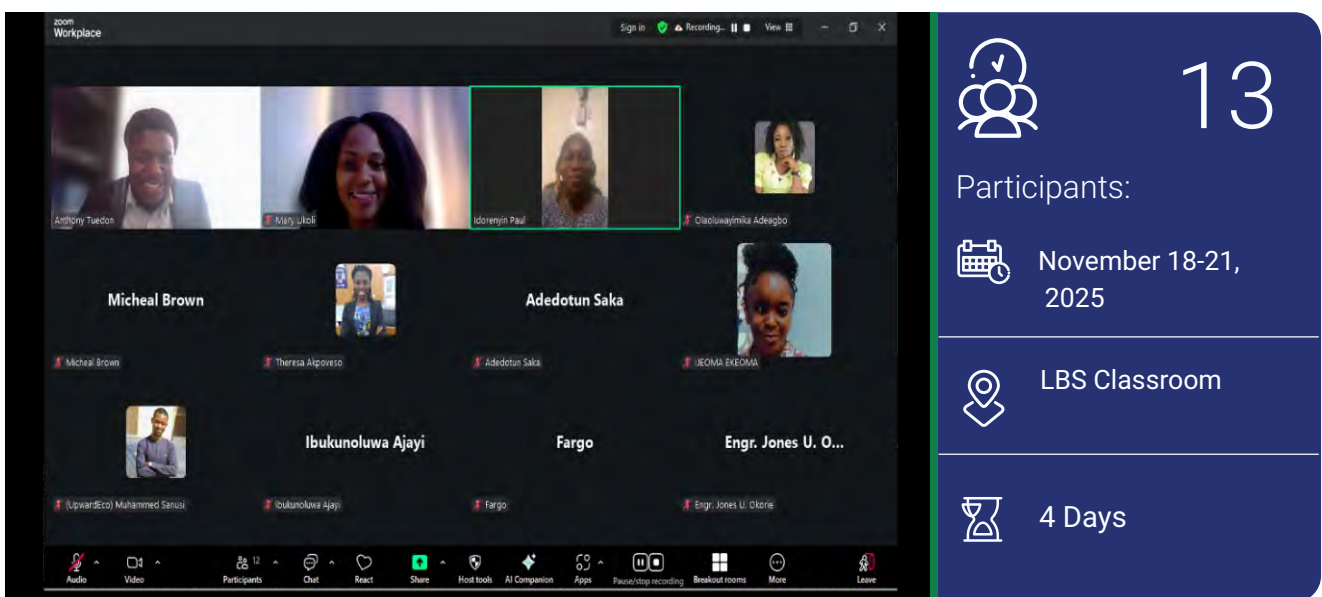

Exploring the Contribution (s) of the Non-Profit Sector to African Economies with Specific Focus on the Creation of Dignified and Fulfilling Work for Young People in Africa. An Africa-Wide Partner Research Project with Centre on African Philanthropy and Social Investment (CAPSI) and Mastercard Foundation

Project Overview

Since the 1990s, the nonprofit sector has been a vital driver of Africa's socio-economic development. Despite its recognised significance, comprehensive data on its impact in fostering dignified employment for young people, particularly marginalised groups, remains limited.

In collaboration with Centre on African Philanthropy and Social Investment (CAPSI) and the Mastercard Foundation, the Lagos Business School (LBS) Sustainability Centre has undertaken a multi-year research initiative to assess the economic contributions of nonprofit organisations to youth employment across 17 African countries. This study employs a mixed-methods approach to evaluate:

- The nonprofit sector's contribution to GDP
- Its role in providing dignified work for young people aged 15 to 35
- The impact of nonprofit sub-sectors in creating opportunities for marginalised groups, including persons with disabilities, refugees, and individuals in correctional facilities

Research Objectives

This project was designed to:

- Generate empirical data on the nonprofit sector's role in youth employment
- Highlight its contributions to dignified work, particularly for young women and marginalised youth
- Explore young Africans' perspectives on economic opportunities within the sector
- Understand transitions from informal to formal employment
- Demonstrate how employment access empowers marginalised youth economically, socially, and politically
- Provide evidence-based insights to inform policy and engage civil society actors

LBSSC Key Contributions and Engagements

As a key country partner, the Lagos Business School Sustainability Centre has played an integral role in advancing this research initiative by:

- Updating literature reviews conducted by CAPSI researchers
- Developing research design for Nigeria and contributing to a universal framework
- Conducting data collection through surveys, interviews, and convenings
- Analysing data and compiling findings into comprehensive reports
- Publishing research outputs to contribute to the sector's knowledge base
- Actively participating in regional convenings and training workshops to foster collaboration and capacity building

Innocent Chukwuma Social Impact Chair and Fellowship



The purpose of the Innocent Chukwuma Social Impact Fellowship (ICSIF) is to facilitate the emergence and development of the next generation of young social impact pioneers and social justice leaders in Nigeria. The fellowship programme spanned three months, with mentorship and advisory sessions, a youth-led web-forum, and sub-grant proposals. Building Youth Leadership Capacity in Nonprofit Management



Recognising the need to build the capacity of youths in the nonprofit sector, LBS Sustainability Centre with the support of the Ford Foundation, West Africa developed and implemented the project 'Support Capacity Building for Young Feminist Leaders through the Non-Profit Leadership and Management Programme.' The project began in June 2017 and has led to the development of certificate programmes for youth and executives in the sector. All activities on the project inspire and empower young women and men to apply leadership skills inspired by feminist values and principles to grow their organisations and movements, build purposeful careers in the nonprofit sector and lead important social innovation initiatives with refined tools and greater confidence.

The project has connected youth to experienced mentors through the senior fellows in residence programme and the participation of industry experts as facilitators. Knowledge creation and dissemination have also been achieved through the development of a 'Nonprofit Management Handbook and Casebook' focused on leadership and management challenges in nonprofit organisations and social enterprises. The project also equips business students in LBS MBA programmes to create social, economic and environmental value through collaboration with Nonprofit leaders and delivery of community service initiatives, known as 'Personal Social Responsibility (PSR)' projects.

Equipping Youth Entrepreneurs and Intrapreneurs in Sustainable Waste Management



The 'Leadership Programme for Sustainable Waste Management' is a capacity-building project that advances enterprise and leadership development among the youths in Nigeria. The project led to the development and delivery of a certificate programme focused on innovative and sustainable methods of waste management as a business (collection, removal, processing, recycling and disposal). Supported by a grant from the Aspire Coronation Trust (ACT) Foundation, the programme has become a platform for sustainability and entrepreneurship for youths to take action to mitigate the environmental and health implications of improper waste management.

The programme is geared towards providing technical advice, business skills, and understanding of sustainability concepts to improve the financial viability of waste management business which can serve as a tool for addressing the rising (52.65%) youth unemployment in Nigeria. It aims to facilitate entry of informal youth-led waste management businesses into the formal economy in a manner that will improve their businesses positively and impact the society.

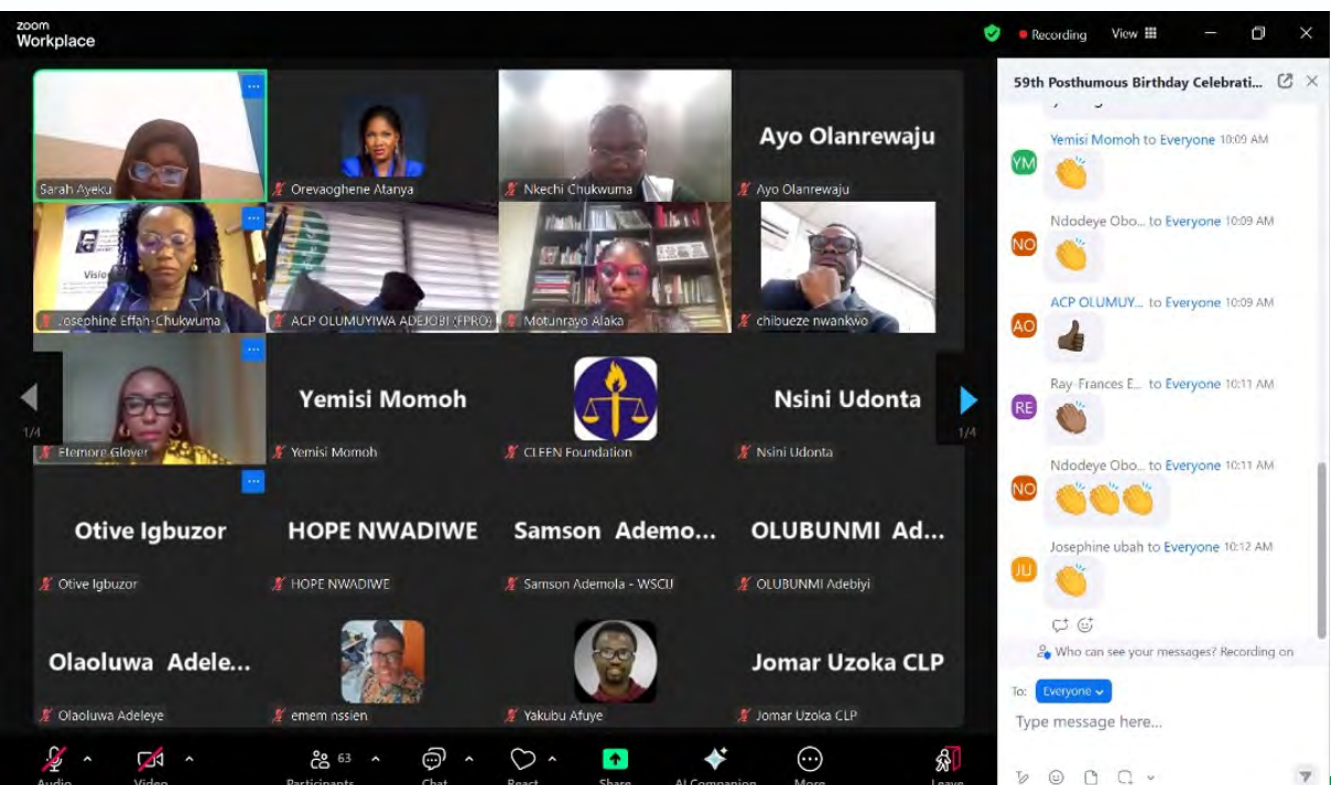
59th Posthumous Birthday Celebration in Honour of Innocent Chukwuemeka Chukwuma

The Nigerian Impact Investing Research Industry Collaborative (NIIRIC) Research and Innovation to Commercialisation Workshop

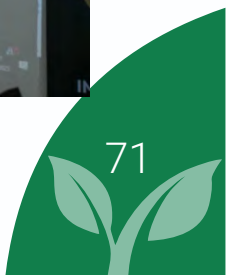
